

he Parish Council met at the beginning of March and addressed a wide range of local issues.

It was agreed that advice be sought on concerns about the excessive fouling by birds roosting in the holm oaks by the Upper Pump House, rendering the use of the adjacent parking slots overnight practically impossible. Councillors agreed that Cransley School be asked to remove the advertising banner from the Pump House railings.

Council News The identification of problem parking areas through the village will be an item for the May meeting

agenda. The Council welcomed the news that Mr and Mrs Kordel were to provide two planters outside their house on High Street to eliminate the pinch point caused by cars parked outside both their house and the pub. Agreement was reached on the size and style of a 'No Parking' sign to be positioned on the top Pump House railings (without causing damage to the railings).

Anti-dog fouling signs are to be fixed to trees in The Avenue. The Council expressed the hope that they will not be vandalised. **REMINDER**: Tree surgeons will be working on trees in The Avenue (the section between the School and Farthing Lane) on 5, 6, 7 April. Councillors queried the planning status of the strip of the field adjacent to The Avenue, which is not now being cultivated for agricultural purposes.

Advance notice was given of a 'Bike Chester' event to be held in June when up to 400 cyclists will be coming through the village. The Council has requested assurances that there will be marshals on Westage Lane, by the bend at the Upper Pump House and further down High Street to ensure the safety of both cyclists and pedestrians; that any litter is removed and that the pub is notified.

Councillors regularly meet with representatives of the Highways Authority and the Cheshire Constabulary. At the last meeting a request was made that a width restriction, as well as the existing weight restriction, be introduced in respect of High Street and Church Street. All the Marbury Ward District councillors have given their support but there is, as yet, no action to report. We will continue to press for this to be enacted. A concave traffic mirror is to be sited at the end of Farthing Lane to improve safety at the junction of the Lane with Westage Lane.

Members expressed their gratitude to the Marbury Ward Councillors for a grant to complete the renovation and repair of the Parish Hall and to the Big Boys' Breakfast for a grant to repair the broken kissing gate on The Avenue.

Comments were made about the poor state of repair of the surface of Westage Lane; it was resolved that Cheshire East Council be approached to request that repairs be carried out.

Our next meeting is scheduled for 8 May, with the Annual Parish Meeting starting at 7.00pm and the main Parish Council meeting at 7.30 pm. Do join us.

Simon Cussons, who lived in the village with his family for many years, died recently. Here, his widow, Gill, reflects on his life.

Simon and I lived in The Old Hall, on High Street, for 28 happy years. It was where we raised our daughters, Lindsay and Georgia.

A keen sports fan, Simon played cricket at Arley and qualified as an umpire, eventually becoming an honorary member of the English Cricket Board – the association of cricket officials. As a tennis player, he founded the Cussons Shield, which was always held on the same day as the Grand National. He also found time to play golf.

Outside of sport, he was active in local politics, becoming a Weaver Vale County Councillor. He was also chairman of six Health Authorities and a governor

of many schools. He also supported the church and helped with the Restoration Appeal.

Simon particularly enjoyed being part of the Christmas tradition of carol singing through the village, stopping here and there to sing carols and raise funds.

We had many parties at the Old Hall—possibly remembered by some of the residents of Great Budworth!

rom the 29th-31st May 2017, Bidston
Community Archaeology will be hosting hands-on archaeology sessions digging test pits at Great Budworth as part of a project to further our understanding of the area in and around Great Budworth from prehistoric times onwards. This is an ideal opportunity for anyone who wants to know more about archaeology and what archaeological remains can tell you about your area's history. It is a great way to gain hands-on experience and learn about the past from the remains left by those who lived through it.

All are welcome, although we ask that those under the age of sixteen have adult supervision; you will be ensured access to and guidance from a trained archaeologist with over twenty years' experience of excavations throughout the UK. You will get a general grounding in archaeology which will will include:

- Training in how to dig a test pit
- Determining different archaeological layers
- Identifying different types of archaeological finds

The excavations will centre on South Bank Field, with the possibility of selected other sites in the area, and will run from 10.00-5pm each day.

There is no cost to participate in the excavations, but donations would be welcome - any money raised would go back into the project.

Arley Hall & Gardens' licence application

t a recent meeting of the Heritage Society Committee, one of our eagle-eyed members reported having seen an announcement in the Northwich Guardian to The effect that our neighbours at Arley have

applied to Cheshire East Council for an extension to their Premises Licence.

They are seeking an increase in the number of people allowed to attend events from 5,999 to 14,999 and an extension of their opening to all year round (except Christmas Day, New Year's Day and the period in between), with an extension of their daily



The Society has made enquiries of Arley to find out

what is being proposed and we have been told that they are seeking flexibility for future events which might go over the existing numbers limit. They have two particular events planned for this summer — Geronimo, which takes place on 27, 28 and 29 May; and Dogfest, which takes place on 17 and 18 June. Attendance at each of these events is estimated at between 8,000 and 10,000 on each day. Arley have therefore applied for an upper limit of 15,000 — simply in anticipation that these annual events will grow over the coming years and may achieve a greater attendance than is expected this year.

Arley stress that both of these are daytime, family-focused events. They also stress that they are acutely conscious of the potential for traffic congestion caused by the events that are planned: they have been working on this problem with the event organisers and Cheshire Police. In addition, Geronimo and Dogfest have engaged a traffic management company. Amberon, to formulate a traffic management plan, which will be available fairly soon and which, by arrangement, can be inspected at the Arley Estate Office.



APRIL IN THE GARDEN

by Tom Acton, Former Head Gardener at Arley Hall

arly flowering shrubs such as Berberis, Forsythia and Spirea can be pruned now, and the less hardy shrubs such as Ceanothus, Fuschia and Hydrangea can also be cut back.

Herbaceous perennials, which are inclined to be tender, are best left until now to be cut back. Among the perennials to benefit from this treatment are the Penstemons, Diascias, Fuschias and border Osteospernums – also any perennials not divided in March can still be divided.

April is a good month to plant evergreen trees and shrubs. The soil will still be moist and starting to warm up. Hardy annuals can also be sown now where they are to flower. Clarkia, annual Poppy and Californian Poppy sown now will flower later this summer.

They are not usually bothered by birds, demanding little except a fine surface raked level, and kept weed free. They will provide a cheap show of colour later this summer. April is one of the busiest months in the vegetable garden if there is to be a succession of vegetables throughout the year, with sowings of Broad Beans, Peas, Lettuce and Spring Onions sown fortnightly, and self-blanching celery planted at the end of the month.
