

lthough there hasn't been a formal meeting of the Parish Council during June, your Parish Councillors have been out and about looking after vour interests.

Huge thanks go to Bob Wilkinson and Malcolm Torrance and their hardworking team for laying the new parking surface on the Parish Field. We hope this will provide much needed parking for visitors to our lovely village.

A number of complaints have been made about the behaviour of cyclists through the village. The Parish Council is in the process of sending a letter to surrounding cycling clubs asking them to remind members to have regard to the rights of residents to privacy, safety, quiet and a clean environment. Please let one of us know of any further nuisance.

The Parish Council has had its usual six-monthly meeting with the Police and

the Highways Authority. An agreement has been reached that our District Councillors will support a scheme to install a width-of-vehicle restriction. as well as the current weight restriction, on the road through the village. We cannot predict whether there will be sufficient funding available for the scheme to be agreed in the current financial year – but we will keep pushing! We are also in continuing discussion concerning the management of parking on the roadside through High Street and Church Street into Westage Lane. We hope to present a series of options to you later in the year.

## The New A556

#### Progress Update from the Highways Agency



Over the winter months, significant progress has been made in progressing the construction of the seven new bridges that form part of this scheme. The bridges are taking shape and the team have completed beam installations on the Bowdon, Millington, the A50 and Tabley bridges. Time- lapsed video footage of the 'Green Bridge' is being captured to showcase the con-

struction of the scheme's flagship structure.

Earthworks have recommenced across the scheme and lime stabilisation work is being undertaken in areas that have been affected by the poor weather that we have encountered over recent months. Four ponds are currently being constructed to deal with rainwater and other 'run-off' from the new road. These attenuation ponds slowly filter contaminants out of the water before it is released safely into local watercourses. These ponds, which will help improve water quality in the meres, are just one of the many environmental improvement measures that this scheme delivers. We are also continuing to install drainage across the scheme and divert utility services away from the route of the new road.

#### Children's Adventure Farm Trust Summer Welly Walk Along The New A556

This is a unique opportunity to see the new road and structures during the construction phase, whilst raising money for a local charity, The Children's Adventure Farm Trust.

#### Saying farewell to Judith Evans

It is with a real mixture of joy and sadness that we say farewell to Judith, who is to be ordained Deacon in Chester Cathedral on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> July and will thereafter be serving her First Curacy at St Wilfrid's Church in Grappenhall (the eventual destination also of a former incumbent in the 1960s and, much more recently, an ordinand from this parish!). Judith (and the family of course!) has been an extremely important part of this parish for many years now, and has worked tirelessly in many different areas of parish and church life, not least the annual Christingle Service, the Growth Action Planning process and of course creating and leading worship and preaching.

Kalmia Latifolia (pictured, right) is a wonderful summer-flowering shrub in flower now (June) and will continue well into July, evergreen, hardy and slow growing. The leaves are like a Rhododendron's. It requires acid soil and is suitable for a small garden. I planted one in the garden at Arley in 1962 and it is now 8-10 ft. tall.



Divide Irises where necessary when flowering is over. Separate the rhizomes, cut off all dam-

aged parts and replant straight away, leaving the top half of the rhizome exposed to sunlight. Make the roots firm and cut off a third of the leaves.

Hortensia (mopheads) and Lacecap varieties of Hydrangea, flowering from midsummer through August and September, have two sister plants requiring different pruning methods in spring. Aborescens annabel has large round panicles of creamy-white flowers in July to September and Hydrangea paniculata, in several



varieties, also flowers to the end of the summer. Both need to be pruned hard back in spring.

Aster frikartii (left) is a mildew-resistant Michaelmas Daisy which starts to flower in July and continues through August to the first frosts and bears deep blue, large daisy-like flowers with yellow centres. At 18 inches it needs a small support.
