





NICK HOPKINSON

Anna asked that I give an update on my liver cancer, so here goes:

n the 25th April life changed when my haematologist telephoned to tell me I had a liver tumour. In nine years he'd never called before, so I guessed it was bad news. There followed two months of stress, tests and more stress. They operated on the 21st June, removing just under half of my liver and leaving a huge scar to remind me of their visit!

I am making good progress, though. After four weeks at home (walking around the garden...round and round and round...) the surgeon allowed me to go to

Mallorca and said I should focus on staying as fit as I can, eating healthily, drinking loads of water, staying positive and avoiding anything that might bring stress with it. He also said that my tumour was up against the main artery in my liver and he thought it sensible to advise the transplant folks in Leeds of my circumstances, just in case it decided to come back. It was a case of hope for the best but plan for the worst. It's a possibility he said, not a probability. I have more tests in a couple of months.



I cycled every day in Mallorca, building up slowly and getting plenty of mid-day snoozes and early nights.

Physically, I'm improving every day; mentally, I have good days and bad days, good mornings and bad afternoons. I'm sometimes social and other times anti-social. I can't predict it and just go with the flow.

Lesley and I have been overwhelmed by the thoughtfulness and kindness shown to us by so many in the village and wanted to take this opportunity to say a big 'thank you' to everyone. We really do live in a remarkable place.

Westage Lane

Whilst your Parish Council has already raised a formal complaint with Cheshire East Council about the complete inaction in respect of the closed section of Westage Lane (see opposite page) you might like to consider lending your weight to this pressure by writing a personal letter of complaint. If so, you might care to write along the following lines:

"I write to protest at the continuing inaction of Cheshire East Council in respect of the closure of Westage Lane. The lane has been closed now since last October, with the result that there has been a significant increase in traffic forced to use Heath Lane as the route into and out of Great Budworth. This has not only caused a deterioration in the surface of Heath Lane, but has also created an unnecessary danger for the users (including many children) of the Ice Cream Farm in Heath Lane.

The time for excuses and prevarication is at an end: your Council must do whatever is necessary to get Westage Lane reopened without further delay.

Residents' concerns: the noise from the tennis club coaching sessions has now diminished somewhat, but it was agreed that the Clerk would confirm whether a commercial business was operating from the club. The overflowing bin at the Westage Lane end of the Avenue has now been emptied. The Avenue has now been strimmed.



Westage Lane and Heath Lane: It was reported that no work

had been carried out on the closed section of Westage Lane to evaluate the scale of the badger problem owing to quotes for the survey work being too expensive. The Parish Council resolved to take out a formal complaint against Cheshire East Council and to require information relating to the road closure under the Freedom of Information Act. This has now been done and a response is awaited. It was also reported that a meeting with a highways engineer from Cheshire West had not identified any way in which improvements could be made to the crumbling roadside of Heath Lane (caused by the increased use following the closure of part of Westage Lane). They have since changed their minds and have promised road planings - we will keep watch.

Parish Hall: A working party was established to work with the Parish Hall Committee with a view to moving their status to a sub-committee of the Parish Council.

Safeguarding Policy: This was adopted.

Projects; The meeting considered a list of project proposals which may be funded using the income from the filming of 'The War of the Worlds'. It was agreed that the resurfacing of the rest of The Avenue should proceed. A further project identified as a priority was the preservation of the Lower Pump House. The Council considered an architect's report on the building and agreed that all the elements identified should be priced and the list brought back to the next meeting. It was also agreed that the services of a parking consultant be sought to produce a report for consideration at the September meeting.
