# **Uncertainty in the Workplace Revd Dr Jenny McKay**

Normally, I would be calling this article "Springtime in the Workplace". However, as I write this piece, Spring seems far away, in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, and it is a daily evolving concern for all of us.

Practically, in my workplace, we are remote working where possible, and those of us who manage laboratory activities put in brief appearances only. Increased cleanings, ever-changing visitor guidelines and local social distancing keep staff as safe as possible and, to date, there has been no confirmed case of COVID-19 in any worldwide facility. The mind boggles as to what may happen



though: will veterinary samples keep coming in; if not, what will happen to current staff? Will there be temporary staff layoffs and what will the impact of any one site being closed have on the business globally?

The major challenge seems to be how to live with uncertainty. People are overwhelmed, sometimes to the point of paralysing depression and anxiety, and future planning is out the window. No-one knows what will happen next, although we do know there will be extensive self-isolation, particularly for the older members of society. Can we donate to local Foodbanks? Can we pick up prescriptions for neighbours? The beauty of the current social media is that we can use it for much good and keep in regular communication with those who are alone or self-isolating. We must rally together and help those in need: is there someone we can call on phone or on Skype? [On this, please see further: Church News, p8 and the WhatsApp item on p3. Ed.]

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

### Village Parking .... yet again!


ur readers will be only too aware that the Parish Council have struggled over many years to find a way to accommodate modern cars in our ancient village proposals have been put forward on many occasions, but in the past it has proved impossible to agree a plan which meets with the agreement of all residents affected.

Year on year the problems increase: residents with more, and often bigger, cars; and the village itself being very much on the tourist map. Attempts to steer cars away from particular trouble spots by putting a 'No Parking' sign on the top Pump House and planters in other parts of the street are routinely ignored. The weather has put the Parish Field out of commission for any parking through the winter, although the Parish Hall Committee have plans to improve the parking surface when the deluge recedes.

So the Parish Council decided to ask Cheshire Highways to review the situation with us. A group of us toured the village with them and CW&C Cllr. Norman Wright recently, looking at the pinch points. We discussed with them various solutions that had been suggested, but the Highways Team discounted most of them on the grounds of either Health & Safety or else non-compliance with Highways legislation.

The Senior Highways Manager said that he had always considered the only solution to be double yellow lines in certain parts of the village. These could possibly be narrow and pale yellow, which have the same legal force as the more common ones. The Parish Council is aware that many in the village have been opposed to this in the past, but have decided to test out current views about it.

On the map shown here you see four areas (coloured) in the centre of the village where double yellow lines were discussed with the Highways Team. The Parish Council are asking you to tell us in which, *if any*, of these areas (marked 1/2/3/4) you would favour having double yellow lines.

The areas where double yellow lines might be considered are: opposite Bakery Cottage (where parking on the road opposite the house hinders - and sometimes prevents - residents from driving in and out); outside The Vicarage and The Hollies; along the Church wall to the left of the lych gate and, finally, in front of the top pump house.

Would residents please write to us indicating their views and preferences. In order to avoid anyone expressing their views more than once, please include your name and address. Responses can be either posted in the Parish Council letterbox in Smithy Lane or emailed to the Parish Clerk, Gill Ayres, at: greatbudworthparishclerk @gmail.com.

The Parish Council will review the responses, including reasons advanced both for and against, at the next Parish Council meeting and will decide whether or not to request CW&C to look into the matter further. If a decision is made to refer the matter to CW&C, then CW&C Highways will undertake its own consultative exercise amongst the local community, when there will be a further opportunity to comment.

#### VILLAGE TREE SURVEY

re your trees worrying you?

Last year a large oak tree on private land collapsed onto the hill in High Street, very fortunately without causing damage to any persons or cars.

The Parish Council decided to undertake a survey of the many trees for which it is responsible, such as the lime trees in the The Avenue, the pleached limes in the High Street, and trees on the Parish Field.

Four professionally qualified contractors quoted for the work, and at the Parish Council meeting in March Lally Tree Management were assigned the work.

When advertising the Tenders for the work, the PC asked each contractor to quote a price for surveying trees owned by householders in the village. Lally Tree Management are offering to do this for £8 per tree, providing the survey of such trees is done at the same time as the PC trees. Householders who would like to identify any of their trees for the survey will need to pay Lally direct for the service. Matthew Lally would like to start the work on 20th April and would obviously want to carry out any private work at the same time.
