



#### HELP FOR TINNITUS SUFFERERS: AND SMALL BUSINESSES!

#### My Practical Tinnitus App - Free in the Apple App Store



Do you, or does someone you know, suffer from that 'ringing in the ears' condition called tinnitus? Over a decade ago, Professor Jim Henry at Oregon University developed a successful tinnitus management programme for audiologists treating patients. After correspondence with Jim and examining more recent clinical research, I then coded a self-help free iPhone/iPad App for individuals with tinnitus. This app is now used in 14 countries and is a 'Tinnitusapps.com' favourite.

Tinnitus makes people anxious to varying degrees and self-assessment forms the first part of the App. Hearing loss usually accompanies tinnitus and for a significant number of people both conditions can be helped by a hearing aid.

The App includes an accurate hearing assessment via a web link, with kind permission from the Belgian sound engineer who developed it. You may then want to see a hearing aid supplier. I also mention some good, cheaper, completely inear canal types of hearing aid on the web. Discovering the personal tinnitus sound frequency leads to therapies with inhibition 'turn off' tones that are helpful for sleep and 'notching' for longer term relief which removes that frequency from favourite digital music tracks.

The app includes frequency match options. Listening to audio can be distracting and the App includes examples and daily/nightly routines, including planned enjoyable activities, soothing relaxation and how to use Cognitive Behavioural Therapy to encourage more positive thoughts, emotions and behaviours.

Links to the original research journal papers and Jim's workbook are included.

### Dear Villagers,

he Parish Council held a virtual Zoom meeting on Monday 7th September, when the following items were discussed.

Councillors agreed to seek three quotations for the work to trees identified as 'Priority 2' (that is, trees requiring attention within six months), as recommended by the independent tree specialist, following his survey of Parish trees earlier this year. To keep costs down, contractors



will be asked to specify any work that they think local volunteers might undertake safely - so watch this space!

Work continues, albeit slowly, on refurbishing the lower pumphouse. During the course of refurbishment, a water leak was discovered under the floor. This needs repair before the spout is replaced, but is proving somewhat problematic: the pump house floor is now uneven and the water supply is disrupted (and possibly contaminated). As a result, the pump house has been temporarily closed until the issue has been resolved.

He then became the first in his family to go to university, to study French & German at Durham, including a year spent in Caen as assistant in a local senior school.

After University, his first job was with Elder Dempster Shipping Co in West Africa, based originally in Liver-

pool. With the closing of the Suez Canal he was sent to work in Dakar, Senegal, helping to handle the shipping forced to travel round the south coast of Africa. His second tour in Accra, Ghana was of even more signifi-

cance as this is where Ruth sailed out to join him and they were married there in 1958 and then lived together for a further 18 months in Freetown Sierra Leone before returning to UK. He then moved to Chance Bros in Birmingham, before returning to Warrington and Lockers, and then Greenings, where he was involved in a management buy-out and became a Director of the resulting 'Screen Systems'.

Sport has always been a major interest for Paul: athletics and playing rugby, football and cricket for school; rugby for University, including the local 15 in Caen - and rugby in Africa (on very hard ground and often involving a pre-match curry as warm up!). On return from the coast, he focused on tennis and became an active team player and longstanding Chairman and President of Stockton Heath tennis club, as well as here in the village.

Now a proud Dad of Hilary and Claire, and with four grandchildren (Max and Eve, and Matthew and Rebecca), his sport is limited to hearing about what the children are playing or watching on TV, but that doesn't stop him having a view on the quality of the match!

We wish Paul all the best for his 90th birthday.



#### HERITAGE SOCIETY

nce upon a time - well, in April actually - we thought that by August we'd be able to go round knocking on doors asking villagers for an annual membership sub of a few pounds – and also invite you to our AGM /social as usual. Registered charities are supposed to have AGMs of course, but we don't fancy getting a thumping fine for holding one! So, making the best of things, we're declaring a 'Membership Subs Holiday' for 2020/21, which we hope you'll think is at least as good as many another free offer.

Our main concern over last year has been the Bottom Pump House (though 'The Running Pump' sounds much better!). Thanks to the wet winter and then Covid lockdown, the work has taken far longer than the Parish Council - or we - ever dreamt or wanted – and issues with the incoming water supply pipe are just about being sorted as this goes to press. This really is good news because at one point it looked as though the building was resting on a mass of waterlogged sand: not good news with the increased lorry traffic using the A559 these days. So when the final bill does come in, the Heritage Society will be handing over £3,500 - as its promised contribution to the five-figure cost of the project. We hope you agree that's Members' money put to good use.

More recently, the Government has published a Planning White Paper (i.e. con-

sultation) aimed at increasing new house building nationally. Among its proposals is one to remove from the local decision-making process all planning applications for fewer than 50 houses. What will then happen to such applications? Some may remember the spate of housing applications ten or so years ago in rural areas such as South Cheshire, which



were pushed through on appeal after initial local refusal. It was the North Cheshire Green Belt that protected villages such as Great Budworth at that time. It may sound like an overgrown privet hedge, but at this point we don't know whether the North Cheshire Green Belt will still be protected. We shall keep an eye on developments!
