Owing to current Covid restrictions and the introduction of social distancing measures, the number of cars allowed on site at any one time is limited. This means that there could be queues to get onto the site. When this happens, a one-car-off, one-car-on system will operate and the gates to the recycling centre will close earlier than advertised to ensure that those already on site can recycle their waste correctly and safely before the scheduled closing time. As a result, you might be asked to return to the recycling centre on the next open day.

The matter will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting on 10th May and also at a meeting of the original charity, but this is unlikely to take place before the AGM in June, which members of the public are welcome to attend.

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The Parish Council held a meeting via Zoom on Monday 1st March. The following is a summary of the main points of discussion and agreed actions.

CW&C Cllr Gibbon attended and reported as follows:

• Council Tax is to increase by 4.99% for the coming year.

• The poor state of drains and gullies was noted; however, CW&C advise that there is insufficient manpower to deal with flooding issues in the borough. CW&C had cleared a

substantial amount of debris from the culvert at the junction of High Street and the A559, though Cllr Gibbon stressed that this was a gesture of goodwill as it was the responsibility of the landowner to ensure proper maintenance.

- As Great Budworth is within 10 miles of a landfill site, we qualify for a grant from the FCC Community Action Fund (previously known as WREN).
- The current consultation on the CW&C Waste Strategy is open until 18th March. Residents were urged to participate by completing the online questionnaire available on the CW&C website.

Lower Pumphouse

The blocked culvert (see item above) had highlighted the problem of water retention in the pumphouse. It was agreed that Cllr Hammond would arrange a meeting to be attended by himself, Cllr Collier and the paving contractor who carried out the work, to agree what needed to be done. (Re-paving has now been carried out.)

It was agreed to organise a working party to clear the accumulated debris from the left side of the pumphouse.

Pleached Lime Tree on High Street

The removal of the dead trees revealed large amounts of clay and water below ground level. This needs to be dug out and replaced with hardcore to aid drainage, so that a new tree can be planted. Cllr Wilkinson agreed to obtain a quotation for this work.

Grant Awards

Grants to the Budworth Bulletin (£450) and to the Friends of Great Budworth School (£500) were approved.

Cyclists on The Avenue

It was agreed that 'No cyclists' signs would be fixed at either end of both sections of The Avenue. A contractor would be sought to repair one of the kissing gates at the bottom of Farthing Lane.

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Memories of Portmeirion

y first and abiding memory of Portmeirion, the Italianate-style village hidden away in North Wales, is seeing the owner, designer and architect, Clough



Williams-Ellis striding around the village every day wearing tweed breeches and knee-high yellow socks. The village has always had a (deliberately) slightly shabby look, with weathered pastel colours on the walls. Most of the cottages and apartments were rented out on twenty-year leases.

Many people travelled up from London every weekend in those early days, a long

drive when there were no motorways. Clough bought a hotel in Shrewsbury as an overnight stopping place for their use on the way to this secret retreat.

In the 1930s HRH Edward, Prince of Wales, discovered Portmeirion. There is only one official record of the Prince staying at Portmeirion, but people were very discreet in those days. He would fly in by sea plane, landing on the estuary waters, though his female friends would travel in a royal car. In 1935 there emerged became one favourite: Wallis Simpson, who travelled to Portmeirion by road as she hated flying. There was a special bedroom for the Prince's use. A local man carved the bedhead with the Prince of Wales's feathers. Clough was informed that he had to provide an en-suite bathroom: after all, as Clough said, "A royal bottom must have its own throne".

From the mid-1960s I became a frequent visitor to Portmeirion. One of my closest friends was Sylvia Jones, wife of Dai Jones, who farmed the Estate. Sylvia bought and sold antiques at the Antique Shop in the village. She had a gift for buying interesting items and the shop was always a delight. It was also the hub of fun and gossip and, if there were enough characters gathered there, she would lock the door to any potential customers so we could "have a good chat!"

During the Second World War, Ivor Novello (famous Welsh Musician, Composer, Actor, after whom the Novello Awards for composing and song writing are named) rented a large apartment in the Castle and was very happy there, especially as he was wined and dined by everyone in the area. Unfortunately, he was arrested buying black market petrol coupons for his Rolls Royce and was sent to prison for four weeks. This period of incarceration really destroyed his life and he stopped composing, moving to live with his mother in Wales after his release. His personal concert grand piano was sold to a local buyer. Thirty years later, when his estate was sold, I was able to buy the piano from a young female relative of Novello's.

Alastair Sim (actor and film director) also had an apartment in the village. He adopted George Cole (who became an actor) when Cole was sixteen years old. Sim paid for (cont'd on p9)

him to go for elocution and drama lessons and he always had a part in any film Sim made!

In 1941 Noel Coward wrote the play Blithe Spirit in one week whilst staying at The Watchtower – one of the cottages overlooking the sea. During a refurbishment of the

cottages, I bought the 1920's table he used when he wrote the play. The table (pictured, right) is now back at Portmeirion on display in The Dome.

Brian Epstein also had a place at Portmeirion and apparently took The Beatles one weekend - hardly their scene, but they apparently gave an impromptu concert in the gardens.

In early 2020 I was asked if I would help with the Portmeirion Archives. It was most inter-



esting to record some of the anecdotal history with the archivist. One of my favourites was of Dai Jones driving his father's tractor through a gate whilst a little man in a long overcoat stood at the side. Dai said in a strident voice "Well, open the gate for me!" He did not realise that he was issuing the command to HRH Edward VIII ...

When Sir Clough Williams-Ellis died in 1978 he wanted his ashes placed into a large



firework rocket to be fired over the village. Sadly, this did not happen, "We can't have bits of Clough landing on our heads" said Sylvia in her strong Welsh accent. I said I thought it was a wonderful idea and replied, "Just put a hat on". After Clough's death I had a telephone call from his wife Amabel (née Strachey). She wanted to buy a four poster bed for herself - Clough did not like them. Her family thought she was too old to have a new bed. "How can I be too old to buy a bed?" she said. All her money was in a Family Trust, so we made a plan and I went over to Plas Brondanw, their beautiful home in Minffordd, a village close to Portmeirion, to buy some old furniture from the garage to help get the funds together. It was very, very damp and the veneers fell off everything at a touch, but I just shovelled them into bags. Amabel was then able to buy her much-wanted bed. A few months later

there was an article about Amabel in the Sunday Telegraph Magazine, along with pictures complete with the four-poster. She told the world the story of how we had managed to fulfil her wish!
