#### On the subject of roads .....

f you read the report of the meeting between Highways and Parish Councillors (pages 8 and 9) you may also be interested in the following extract from the Chairman of Antrobus Parish Council's Annual Report last year:

Highway maintenance continues to be an issue on the village road network, which is 36 miles long over 33 roads. Reduced budgets year on year for District Councils has meant maintenance has not been carried out. This is not just a problem for Antrobus but affects many district councils who are Highway Authorities.

The 'Greenbook' approach means rural areas are affected to a much greater extent than urban areas of any district council. What the Greenbook does is pose the test of 'benefit to most people' by the proposed expenditure. The consequence is urban areas and even South of England versus the North results in public expenditure meeting that test leaves less for the North and nothing for rural areas. Antrobus has been on CW&C highway maintenance programme for several years but is always at the bottom of the list because it is a small Parish in terms of population. So what might have been a small job becomes a much larger one.

After the last election the Prime Minister, no less, said his government would replace the Greenbook test with a more equitable assessment procedure. We wait to see the practical effect of this change. In the meantime, we ask everyone to use the CW&C website to report every highway issue and send a photograph, please, as this helps the engineers at CW&C to assess the many complaints they receive. Antrobus Parish Council will also report complaints it receives, but individual complaints are added up so please report it to both to your Parish Council and directly to CW&C. It has more impact.

#### **Parish Councillor Vacancy**

## Great Budworth Parish Council currently has a vacancy for a member of the public to become a Parish Councillor

If you feel you would like to get involved in making decisions about your local community and would like the opportunity to make a contribution to the area in which you live or work, then this is the position for you!

In order to qualify to serve as a Parish Councillor you must be aged 18 years or over, be a citizen of the UK, the Commonwealth or the Republic of Ireland and be eligible to vote; or, during the whole 12 month period before the co-option, you must (a) have owned or been the tenant of land in the Parish, or (b) had your principal or only place of work in the Parish, or (c) lived in the Parish or within three miles of it.

There is now a two-stage process:

1. If ten electors of the Parish give written notice to the Returning Officer, Cheshire West and Chester Council, **on or before** 9<sup>th</sup> **July 2021** (Council Offices, 4 Civic Way, Ellesmere Port, CH65 0BE), requesting an election to fill this vacancy there will be an election, with all local electors entitled to vote.

#### **But:**

2. If no such notice is given on or before 9th July, the Parish Council will be entitled (but not obliged) to fill the vacancy by co-option at its September meeting.

Any elector can apply to be co-opted. Please send all applications in writing (with whatever information about the candidate you wish to be considered) to Gill Ayres, Clerk to Great Budworth Parish Council, Great Budworth Parish Hall, Smithy Lane, Great Budworth, CW9 6HL, or (preferably) email her at: greatbudworthparishclerk@gmail.com Tel: 07907 456 037

People taking action for wildlife

#### GO WILD FOR WILDFLOWERS!

Since 1960, Cheshire has lost 99% of its wild-flower meadows and Cheshire Wildlife Trust (CWT) seeks everyone's help to create more space for them. One of the best places for wild-flowers is our road verges, so it's important to know what condition they are in. To help CWT find out more, they've launched a road verge citizen science project.

### PARISH COUNCIL MEETING WITH HIGHWAYS MONDAY 14<sup>TH</sup> JUNE

Parish Councillors, along with Unitary Councillor Lynn Gibbon, met with representatives of the Police and CW&C Highways on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> June. The meeting was in the form of a 'walkabout', during which various issues of concern to the community were discussed. (It should be reiterated here that all of these issues have been discussed with these same

bodies before!).

#### POSSIBILITY OF HGV RESTRICTIONS THROUGH VILLAGE

Despite a lengthy discussion, limited solutions emerged. Highways agreed to investigate the potential for improvement to existing signage and the Parish Council will consider:

- the best ways and means to communicate with residents about goods deliveries by HGVs to their homes;
- targeted correspondence to residents of School Lane in respect of parking and deliveries;
- options for contacting delivery destinations, such as Arley Hall;
- possible camera to monitor traffic (location to be determined).

#### YELLOW LINES OUTSIDE BAKERY COTTAGE

CW&C will start the mandatory consultation process, with a view to installing a stretch of double yellow lines outside of and opposite Bakery Cottage, High Street. This follows

countless occasions when the residents of Bakery Cottage have been unable to either enter or leave their property by car owing to vehicles parked outside their home.

#### **ONGOING CONCERNS**

#### These include:

The lack of a maintenance plan for footpaths and pavements, with particular concern relating to the footpath along Budworth Lane up to the Comberbach. A similar problem exists on the northbound stretch of the A559 from Great Budworth to the Cock O'Budworth.

The lack of a maintenance plan for gullies and drainage in order to mitigate flood risk. At present these are supposed to be inspected annually, but there was agreement that whilst some could be reviewed every two years, others demanded inspections two or three times a year. It was noted that the owner of the land on the north side of High Street, where it meets the A559, had carried out some remedial work.

#### A559

Councillors raised a number of issues in respect of this major road:

- the current speed limit;
- potential for traffic lights at the junction with High Street;
- options for a one way system coming from Comberbach;
- a suitable pedestrian foot way to Comberbach;
- a recent incident at the bottom of the hill in which a trailer towed by a
  vehicle turning into High Street from the A559 overturned, narrowly
  avoiding two cyclists waiting at the junction to turn out of High Street;
- the volume of cyclists attempting to cross at the junction.

#### PARKING CONGESTION

This issue has been discussed within the Parish Council countless times, as well as being the subject of a report on a survey among residents in 2016. As was clear then – and remains the case now – any proposed solution simply shifts the problem to another part of the village. The issue is intractable. That said, many of the problems arise from either thoughtless parking or a preference among some residents to park on the street rather than using their own off-road parking (the survey revealed that only 17 properties in the village are without off-road parking).

#### OTHER TOPICS OF DISCUSSION

- The possibility of installing digital cameras at the bottom of High Street in order to ascertain lorry movements up the hill and also to identify problems when two large vehicles attempt to pass whilst going uphill to Comberbach. Comberbach PC to be consulted.
- To request CW&C to pay for three pillars outside Ring O'Bells to reduce the potential from physical impact to the house from HGVs. The Parish Council is liaising with the owner.
- The number of potholes throughout the village and its immediate environs. CW&C routinely wait until potholes are extremely bad, at which point resurfacing may take place. In the meantime they pose a threat to vehicles and a very real danger to cyclists.
