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



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Memories of Portmeirion-Part 3

t's funny how lives and families interconnect, particularly for such a creative one as the Williams-Ellis family. Clough Williams-Ellis, the architect and founder of Portmeirion, was the great uncle of David Williams-Ellis (pictured), a sculptor, who created the British Normandy Memorial, a bronze depicting three soldiers in Ver-sur-Mer, Normandy, overlooking Gold Beach, which was unveiled to great acclaim to commemorate the D-Day Landings.

David inherited a small manor house, Carregfelen, as part of the Portmeirion Estate. It is almost on the beach between Black Rock Sands and Criccieth. A 14th Century dwelling nestling in a very secluded spot, it was used by David's family mainly as a holiday home. He and his first wife, Serena, an antique dealer then later interior designer, had three children. They lived for twenty-five years in Cumbria whilst restoring a derelict farmhouse. After their divorce David married Nicola 'Nikki' Burrows, the



mother of Edoardo 'Edo' Mapelli-Mozzi, who married Princess Beatrice in 2020. Nikki and David now live near to Chipping Norton in Oxfordshire where David has his studio.

Unfortunately, Portmeirion Hotel was gutted by a large fire in 1981. It took seven years to rebuild and was eventually fully restored in 1988. I was fortunate to be invited to the grand re-opening: it was a lovely sunny day with tables for eight on the lawn near the swimming pool. On the 'top table' was Robin Llywelyn, Clough's grandson and managing director of Portmeirion Estate, local dignitaries and Jan Morris, the author. Jan died in November 2020, aged 94, and her ashes were scattered in the River Dwyfor in Llanystumdwy, just below the monument where Lloyd George is buried and - going full circle – the monument designed by Clough Williams-Ellis.

• Total income for the year was £16,400. Total expenditure for the year was £16,100. **Public forum:**

It was argued by local farmers and landowners that the proposal to make Budworth Lane one-way would make the A559 junction more, rather than less, dangerous. Farm machinery and caravans would all need to make right-hand turns across the traffic and up the hill on Budworth Lane. Cllr. Gibbons (CW&C) advised that the Northwich Strategy recognises the existing dangers at the crossroads but no feasible proposal had been put forward. The one-way proposal originated from discussions at Comberbach Parish Council about potential bids to create safer walking and cycling routes. Both Comberbach and Great Budworth Parish Councils were currently seeking the views of local residents. The comments made at the meeting would be taken into account.

OUR PARISH CLERK

Gill Ayres has carried out the role of Clerk to Great Budworth Parish Council since January 2019. Here, she describes how the much misunderstood role has changed over the years, thanks to new legislation.

The role of the Parish Clerk has changed a lot since the days when it just meant recording the minutes of meetings in long hand . That was before the arrival of the internet and electronic means of communication. For example, during the month of August, which is traditionally a quiet month, I dealt with close on 400 emails.



Issues I deal with range from queries about Parish Hall teas and historic buildings in the village to quotations for new defibrillator pads, and tree surgery, to the insurance of the Parish Hall. There were legal notices about advertising the vacant post on the Parish Council and then applications for co-

option; returns to Cheshire West on Community Infrastructure Levy; dealings with them about water quality at the Dene Spring; consultations on planning applications; and attempts to get our Asset Report updated. There have been questions and comments about the introduction of yellow lines on High Street and proposals for Budworth Lane as well as requests for input on bus and waste strategies, a new heritage list and new funding streams, jubilee celebrations, Remembrance Day, and regular updates about the coronavirus pandemic.

Your Parish Clerk is also Responsible Financial Officer, so on top of the regular admin there are invoices to pay, VAT to reclaim and the preparation of a monthly budget update. And then in April / May there are documents to submit for internal and external audit, culminating in the Annual Governance and Accountability Review whereby the Parish Council must demonstrate it has conducted its business in accordance with the law, regulations and proper practices.

I hope this gives you a flavour of what a Parish Clerk does. Some people I speak with still think the job is something to do with the Church and are not aware that the Parish Council is a tier of local government. We have very limited resources, so much of what we do means negotiating with the next tier up, namely Cheshire West and Chester, but please do not hesitate to raise any issues that you think the Parish Council can help with. Report on Annual Parish Meeting

reat Budworth's Annual Parish Meeting was held on Monday 6th September. UMany readers may wonder what the difference between this meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting is, so it's perhaps worth explaining. The Annual Parish Council Meeting is held in May and deals with those things that only need doing once a year. These include electing the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, appointing committees, appointing representatives to other bodies (e.g. the Parish Hall, Bowling Club, Heritage Society) and appointing individual councillors to lead on specific matters of business (e.g. Manchester Airport, HS2, Parish Council Website).

The Annual Parish Meeting is a legacy from the Middle Ages, before Parish Councils existed and when all local decision-making was carried out by meetings of the whole community. This meeting is open to all residents in the Parish, who have the right not only to attend but also to speak on any matter of local interest. This is in contrast to a Parish Council meeting, where electors who are not Councillors have no *automatic* right to speak (though here in Great Budworth our Parish Council agenda has a routine item allowing members of the public to raise issues or comment on any matter).

The full report of the Annual Parish Meeting is available on the Great Budworth website (under Great Budworth Parish Council/Documents). The following is a summary of the Chairman's report on the Council's business over the previous year:

Meetings with Highways continued regarding a number of issues (eg parking, HGV access, condition of roads and safety at the junction with A559).

- A survey of trees owned by the Parish was completed.
- Restoration work to the Lower Pumphouse was completed. •
- The Parish Council received a payment of £750 for filming in the village.

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NICK HOPKINSON MBE DL

he death of Nick Hopkinson ('Hoppy' to everyone in the village who knew him) on 2nd September came as a great shock to most of us for, although we knew he had battled cancer in the past, we assumed that his larger than life personality and physique had conquered that demon.

Nick was buried in Great Budworth Church on Wednesday 15th September and a memorial service took place on 13th October, attended by very many people from near and far and from all walks of life.

What follows hardly does justice to the multi-faceted man known by many - in the village, the county, the country and beyond, but it gives some idea of the man.

Nick was born in Bury, the middle son of three, into a family that embraced entrepreneurship but did not neglect the less well off. One of his first projects was his local Bolton Lads and Girls Club. It was a rundown youth centre in a dingy part of the town, but was rebuilt in the late 1980s, with impetus from Nick, to become a state-of-the-art model for others to copy around the country, with climbing walls, boxing and dance studios and a group of volunteer mentoring staff. Visited by David Cameron when he was prime minister, it led to the creation of the OnSide Network of Youth Zones, a nationwide string of 14 youth clubs that have helped 50,000 young people.

Having discovered his talent for fundraising, Nick went from strength to strength. He started with the odd fancy-dress party and an annual boxing competition with the army in the Albert Halls in Bolton and learnt to become a persuasive auctioneer.

His day job, meanwhile, was growing his business, Mark Two, selling kitchens and bathrooms to retail units in the high street. He started in 1986 with one lorry and a rented warehouse in Prestwich and within 15 years had a fleet of lorries, several depots around the country and a turnover of £100m. Nick sold Mark Two in the 2000s and in the past decade began to invest in the business ideas of his former employees.

A love of the outdoors, particularly walking, spurred Nick to organise sponsored walking trips for large groups. Never slow to challenge himself, he chose to climb Mount Kilimanjaro and reached the summit no fewer than nine times, earning the nickname 'Babu', or grandfather, among the Tanzanian porters. Some of the funds raised went towards the building of a Tanzanian orphanage.

For many years Nick was a party animal - and, at 6'4", a noticeable presence when he walked into a room. He had a distinctive sartorial style, preferring kilts (which, he reminded everyone, had been invented in Lancashire) in tweed, denim and linen, but never tartan.

A devoted family man, Nick met Lesley, his wife, whilst they were both at university. Together they raised three sons, all of whom run their own businesses. Max and Oliver



co-own Bind, a digital marketing company; Toby, the youngest, has an online marketing consultancy, Finley Growth.

At the ago of 49 Nick was diagnosed with haemochromatosis, a hereditary condition of which he was previously unaware, in which the iron

levels in the body slowly build up over many years, leading to damage in parts of the body such as the liver, joints, pancreas and heart. He stopped drinking alcohol, concentrated on his fitness and cut out red meat and shellfish from his diet. He continued to raise money for charity, including the NHS and food banks during the pandemic as well as a brain scanner for the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital.

Last year he was appointed High Sheriff of Cheshire, an appointment that brought with it a velvet costume that amused him (see Bulletins of April and May 2020). Although the pandemic meant that he was unable to fulfil the role as fully as he had planned, in conjunction with the Lord Lieutenant, David Briggs, and Steve Morgan (founder of Redrow plc), he managed to raise an astonishing £1.3m hardship fund to help victims of the pandemic.

Whilst he was widely known beyond Cheshire for his charity and fundraising, here in the village Nick concentrated his efforts on supporting the Church Restoration Fund. Like most of us, Nick was enormously fond and proud of our Grade 1 listed 800-year old church. Built of Cheshire sandstone, it needs careful and expensive maintenance – which in turn requires dedicated fundraising. To this task Nick brought his considerable skills, playing a key role in raising £17,000 in 2020. Those of us attending an event at which he was auctioneer were in turn charmed, coaxed and chivvied into buying lots. Never a bully, though, he adapted his style to his audience. And he will be much missed on the Church Restoration Fund Committee, where his incisiveness and ability to get to the point at issue were so valued.

The list of charities that Nick supported and for which he raised funds is too long to include here: suffice to say that it would have filled the available space. Our community has lost a big-hearted man.

"This is the true joy in life, the being used for a purpose recognised by yourself as a mighty one; the being thoroughly worn out before you are thrown on the scrap heap; the being a force of Nature instead of a feverish selfish little clod of ailments and grievances complaining that the world will not devote itself to making you happy."
