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



OUR VILLAGE

Ve're very lucky to live in such a historic and attractive village, but some who've recently come to live here maybe hadn't reckoned on a downside to owning a house here - and we're not referring to parking problems!

With the exception of parts of Smithy Lane, the whole village lies within, and is protected by, the government's green belt policies. The village centre is also designated as a Conservation Area and many of the old houses in the village are listed as of 'Architectural and / or Historic Interest'. The plan below shows the extent of the



Conservation Area.

These designations have helped protect us from large scale developments, such as happened to Comberbach. Indeed, even here in Great Budworth, in the 1960s a maior contractor tried (unsuccessfully) to build 40 new homes behind High Street and Church Street. The plan included gaining access by demolishing Smithy Cottage and the Bowling

Green!

It was not until the 1970s that mains drainage was installed in the village. Until then a tanker would arrived every Tuesday morning to empty the outside loos. In the 1980s all the electric wires that festooned High Street and Church Street were moved underground and a sympathetic street lighting scheme was installed shortly after.

But with these designations there also come restrictions on what we can do with our houses - and the additional expense this sometimes involves. Estate agents and solicitors often fail to point these issues out! These include:

- The green belt limits development of new properties and extensions beyond a size which would affect the character of the green belt.
- The fact that we are in a Conservation Area limits the rights of householders to change and extend their homes, which might otherwise be allowed under Permitted Development Rights. Any extension or development we may want to make, including lopping or cutting down trees (some mature trees have Tree Preservation Orders), requires permission from planners in Cheshire West and Chester Council.
- All our listed buildings (most of the village core) have the further requirement that any alteration, whether internal or external, including to garden walls, needs Listed Building Consent, whether planning consent is needed or not! Any repairs must be

The Bala Children's Centre in Kenya



The Bala Children's Centre in Kenya was set up in 2000 by Bishop Domnic Ochoo, who took ten children into his home. It has grown rapidly and now there are over 200 children and 10 teachers who attend the Centre. These children are mainly orphans, of whom around 80 live at the Centre. The rest walk daily to the Centre often long distances.

As you can imagine, the Centre has been devastated by Covid.

A few years after its start, a UK charity was set up by some stalwarts in Gloucestershire to help with the financing of the Centre. They have done a fantastic job raising awareness and funds. We have helped and now have eight sponsors in Great Budworth, but are looking for more.

The work that has been done is best explained in the following letter:

"My name is Ezra Omollo. I'm 24 years old having graduated from the University of Nairobi on 14th September 2018. Coming from a severely disillusioned family with less than a dollar a day income and nine other kids, I was taken into the Bala Mercy Children's Centre with the help of Bishop Domnic and was sponsored by someone in the U.K. When I completed high school in 2012, I passed and earned an admission into the university. Juggling between assistance from Bishop Domnic, other friends and earning while I was on holidays, I managed to complete uni. (However, some of my friends who scored university grades but were not eligible for the government loan found it even harder to get into the next level of education-university as they couldn't raise the relatively higher amount required for the self-sponsored students).

Getting to pass through the university has been a great blessing as I now hold in my hands a teaching certificate which will feed me and my family and friends and

of the same materials and pattern previously used.

• We are also required to comply with Building Regulations and to notify the Council's Building Control Office of any relevant work we wish done before starting that work. This includes control of fittings such as fires and boilers, and any electrical work unless carried out by a registered competent person.



The 'new' houses built on the north side of Westage Lane (in the 1980s & 90s) are subject to even further restrictions under planning law by virtue of an Article 4 Direction, which effectively totally removes all permitted development. This area was developed with advice of the Royal Fine Arts Commission to reflect the nature of the old village. Houses of two, three and four bedrooms of mixed architectural styles linked by pathways were designed to mirror the rest of the village. Some of these features are protected in a way similar to listed buildings.

So it can be wise to talk to Cheshire West & Chester's planners before your builder gets to work.

In total twelve matches were completed, with the club winning ten and losing two. Unfortunately, several matches were cancelled owing to poor weather conditions.


The end of season presentation dinner was held at The Cock o'Budworth and awards were presented for:

A meeting of Great Budworth Parish Council was held on Monday 6th September in the Parish Hall. The meeting was attended by all seven Parish Councillors, all three unitary councillors and 11 members of the public.



The following is a summary of the proceedings. Full minutes of the meeting will be posted on the Great Budworth website. The next meeting will be held on 1st November. All are welcome.

Budget 2021-2022

The budget for 2021-22 was reviewed and approved.

Lower Pumphouse

Cllr. Lee reported that she was due to meet a representative from CW&C at the pump house on 16th September, when a sample of spring water would be taken for analysis.

Parish Hall and Parish Field Agreement

Transfer of assets to the newly formed Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) had been approved. CIO trustees had met and work was in hand to deal with such administrative matters as changing the bank account and policy matters, such as fire policy. The Parish Hall has been added to the Parish Council insurance policy.

Bowlling Green and Tennis Club Lease renewal

A meeting has been arranged for Monday 27th September to discuss this. As well as the agreement, the meeting will also consider insurance matters, bearing in mind the issue of insurable interest.

The Avenue

It was not clear whether it is beneficial to remove the epicormic growth from lime trees or not, and so maintenance will continue as at present, with the existing contract simply to trim and strim the undergrowth.

Assets

At the time of the meeting there had been no response to the WhatsApp and Bulletin requests for a volunteer to help re-value the parish council's assets (*NB: there has since been an offer of help*). It was noted that there are two dimensions to the task: (1) to update and possibly re-value the assets in the Parish Asset Report to ensure we have appropriate insurance cover, especially for the Parish Hall; and (2) to revise the report so that it includes the values required by the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR).

Cllr. Wilkinson was thanked for his work to remove rails from the new gate to ease access for pushchairs, etc.

Cllr. Robins is looking into suggestions as to how best to mark HM Queen's Jubilee next year and would report back to the next meeting.

As many of our readers will already know, the death of Nick Hopkinson ('Hoppy'), was announced on 2nd September.

We shall include a full appreciation of Nick in a later issue, but in the meantime his wife, Lesley, has issued this letter to us all.

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

I would like to thank you all for your support and kindness over the last few weeks following the shock of the loss of my husband Nick (Hoppy). It still feels bewildering to write those words.



The display of respect at his private funeral on Friday 17th September was very moving and much appreciated.

As well as being my husband, Nick had a great many friends and business colleagues around the country - and indeed the world - and his untimely death has made an impact which is greater than I could have imagined.

There was a part of him that was in 'public ownership' and I have been overwhelmed by letters from people I don't even know - telling me what a difference he made to their small charity organisations, or how he mentored them to take their fundraising to another level - from the Manchester Camerata to an orphanage in Tanzania, from Petty Pool and The Joshua Tree to the Haemochromatosis Society.

During his year as High Sheriff, he helped many other causes and continued chairing some of their committees even after his year ended - Cheshire Food Bank being one example.

As well as his main focus on creating centres of excellence for supporting young people - the 'Youth Zones' across the country (the Warrington one is nearing completion), he was also personally raising money for Manchester Royal Children's Hospital, one project for the children's cancer department and another project for a children's brain scanner.

I am organising a Thanksgiving Memorial Celebration of his life on October 13th at 1.30pm and will - in true Hoppy tradition - be using this service to tie up some of these smaller projects, as they were funded by selling pieces of art that he had commissioned. This is not an appeal for donations from friends in Great Budworth for once! This is aimed at some of the corporate representatives and business leaders who will be at the memorial service.

I have not put a public notice about this service in a national newspaper or on social media - deliberately - because already I am being overwhelmed by numbers of people intending to come. The church will be at full capacity and we will have

speakers outside. Much of the seating inside the church will have to be reserved, unfortunately - as some people are coming from great distances across Europe - and I will have to ensure them a seat in church.

Everyone is welcome - but I would ask if villagers could hold back until most of the visitors arrive, before filling up the back of the church - or if it is a nice day, bring a chair and sit outside...

I am concerned about the continued risk of Covid, of course - so am asking people coming to take lateral flow tests and to wear masks if coming into the church.

After the service, everyone is welcome to wander back to the garden of The Old Hall for refreshments - although again, this could be a challenge if numbers get out of control.

I would ask anyone who is intending to come back to The Old Hall to kindly email our PA, **Donna** (donna@hoppyhome.co.uk) with your name(s) so that we have some idea of numbers for catering purposes.

I am indebted to local people for their offers of parking on the day, for the help in traffic management, for your tolerance - and of course to Alec our Vicar for his constant support. It was suggested by several people that this service should be in Chester Cathedral.... but I know that Nick would rather it was here - so I apologise for the inevitable major disruption on October 13th .
