
Cheshire West Libraries Mobile Library

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A meeting of Great Budworth Parish Council was held on Monday 7th February in the Parish Hall. The meeting was attended by all eight Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk and five members of the public

Budget and Precept 2022/23

The draft budget for 2022/23 was approved. It was agreed that the sum of £1,500 should be allocated to the Platinum Jubilee programme of village events.

Highways Matters

<u>Budworth Lane/A559</u>: A negative response had been received from CW&C Highways to the proposal (which originated in Comberbach, not Great Budworth) for a one-way system along Budworth Lane on the far side of the A559, but no other ideas were put forward and it was agreed that it was difficult to see what else the Parish Council can do since responsibility ultimately rests with CW&C.

<u>School Lane:</u> Cllr Robins agreed to speak with the new Head of the school and ask that problems associated with vehicles using the lane be brought to the attention of parents, teachers and suppliers who use the route.

Parish-owned Trees

The Parish Council's application for permission to carry out work to the holm oak trees at the top pumphouse has been approved by CW&C.

The quotation from Treefellers for work to Parish-owned trees was accepted.

Parish Hall & Parish Field Management Agreement

The new Management Agreement between the Parish Council (the legal owner of the Parish Hall and Parish Field) and the Parish Hall Committee was approved by all and signed by the chairman, Cllr Collier, for the Parish Council and Cllr Hammond for the Parish Hall Charity.

Bowling Green and Tennis Club Agreement

The draft lease will be amended to provide clarity on insurance arrangements.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee

Maggie Blower was thanked for the work she has done, and continues to do, to pull together an excellent programme of events to celebrate the Jubilee. She presented a breakdown of likely costs and the Parish Council agreed to contribute £1,500 towards this.

Small Grants Application

The sum of £400 was approved for the Budworth Bulletin.

IN MEMORY OF MARK DEACON

he village of Great Budworth became an integral part of Mark's life when his parents began to build their family home here. Five years later, in 1972, the move from Warrington to the village was completed.

The eldest of five children, Mark immersed himself in village life. An accomplished pianist and a bell ringer, he embraced village life. Mark's former choirmaster from St. Margarets in Orford, Norman Baker, was also a prominent member of the church and the village and many evenings were spent partaking of a few beers reminiscing. Mark's passion for sailing began at Budworth Sailing Club and his love of the sea continued throughout his life. In a fibreglass canoe, built in the garage on Southbank, a small gang of



young people enjoyed blissful summers on the Mere! The sun obviously shone all of the time!

Mark attended Boteler Grammar School in Warrington, then qualified in medicine at Liverpool University, following in the footsteps of his father, Fred. Mark made a difference in the world of surgery with accolades as Consultant Surgeon and Honorary Senior Lecturer in the Midlands (Upper GI Specialism), President of the Pancreatic Surgical Society of Great Britain and Ireland and Assessor of Examiners for the FRCS, to name a few. Sadly, Mark died aged 64 years in March 2019 leaving his extended family bereft. We continue to celebrate Mark's life and his light continues to shine.

From the WI Archive

The very first meeting for the WI took place on Wednesday 3rd February 1932 at Providence House at 2.30pm. (Although the village hall was available, it was in its early days and was only used by the

Boys' Club. The facilities at Providence House were more suitable for the WI and Mrs Shindler, whose home it was, was a committee member.)

Miss Egerton Warburton presided. There were 53 members and six intending members present. The minutes of the last two meetings were read and signed. Mrs G L Love was elected as delegate to the Cheshire AGM at the Refectory in Chester.

Mrs Adair proposed and Mrs Love seconded a charge of 2d per head for a cup of tea and a cake - with an additional 1d per cake be charged to anyone wanting more than one !!! Mrs Shingler was appointed president of the tea sub-committee.

Mrs Love gave a very interesting talk on marmalade making and was enthusiastically applauded after a hearty vote of thanks.

During the next few meetings speakers included a demonstration on plucking and dressing a fowl, lessons on the singing of Jerusalem, a demonstration of cane seating, another on glove making - and classes were arranged for members to have a go. A past member, Mrs Kathleen Harris, told us she made one glove but never managed to make the other one !! Mrs Bromley Davenport spoke on 'Making the best of Life'. That has to be as apt today as in 1932.

The WI continued to meet each month at Providence House for the next 25 years, but in November 1957 Mrs Shindler died and the members decided it was time to move to the Club Room, which was the former name of the parish hall. More archives next month.

Staff at the George were superb and the meal was outstanding. Our

thanks to Christopher Wright for agreeing to hold this event and making a generous donation of **£1040.**

The Auction was one of the highlights and we were delighted that Lord Ashbrook volunteered to be our auctioneer for the evening. His charming, persuasive, and amusing manner soon had the bids rolling in at levels well beyond our expectations. The 10 auction prizes included hospitality at the George & Dragon and the Angel@Knutsford, which both exceeded previous levels, as did the prize of a sumptuous afternoon tea for six with a personal butler in attendance! There were properties for the weekend in London and Cumbria, with fierce bidding from guests keen to secure somewhere for their staycations.

Who could resist having the chef from the celebrated San Carlo's restaurant to create dinner for twelve people in their own home and clearing away afterwards? Well, several people thought that, too, as bidding reached new records. Sue Ritchie, family historian, offered help with research to build one's family tree, which became even more popular this year. Lord and Lady Ashbrook offered prizes of conducted trips around their gardens, with tea afterwards, as well as an opportunity to sharpen up one's tennis skills on Arley's own court.

The auction alone raised an outstanding figure of **£15,100**, including kind donations from people who missed their favourite lot. 
HOW TO MAKE YOUR SCARECROW

Villagers are being invited to join in with the Queen's Jubilee celebrations by creating a scarecrow of their own (with a royal

theme) and here are tips as how to make one.

pic, right). Tie VERY tightly.

 You will need a 7 foot and a 4 foot pole or cane. Stuff 2 old stockings with straw/rags and attach to each end of the 4 foot pole.



3. Then, either stuff two more stockings for the legs or stuff directly into trousers tied at the ankles.

2. Attach the arms with string to the 7 foot pole 6 inches

below the top, preferably with a clove hitch knot (see

- 4. Make braces with string and hang them onto the arms. Dress the scarecrow, stuffing the body directly into the shirt/ blouse.
- 5. Now the head: stuff a small hessian bag or similar, tie the neck tightly. Paint or stitch the face.
- 6. Attach the head to the pole. Don't worry if the head is square you can cover it with a wig or hat.

We suggest that you exhibit your scarecrow outside your house some time after mid-May.

THE BIG BOYS' BREAKFAST

he Budworth Big Boys' Breakfast proved a great success! A small queue awaited

the opening at 9.00am and breakfast was served until a little after midday. Eggs were donated by Poplar Farm, to whom we extend our sincere thanks, and the raffle raised £100 on a hamper kindly donated by the Friends of the School, along with other donated prizes.

Attendance was just a tad less than normal, but something over 90 breakfasts were served. Reduced numbers were probably the result of holidays and



Covid factors. The only element of disruption came from the alarm system that chose to be activated and proved difficult to reset. The usual array of calorific content was provided in a seamless system, proving the efficiency of integrated teamwork! All in all, the profit amounted to a little over £850 which will result in significant donations to the Parish Hall (which has had diminished revenues in recent months), the Friends of the School, the Budworth Bulletin and St Luke's Hospice.

CLOSURE OF SOOT HILL

A nemergency closure of Soot Hill was implemented on 28th December owing to the collapse of a substantial retaining wall that supported the highway. A nearby building was damaged by falling masonry. Thankfully nobody was injured.

It's not safe to access the site at present because of the risk of further material falling onto the site. High voltage cables have been exposed because of the land slip; these are suspended above a void – with remnants of the collapse material sitting on the live cables.

The first stage of the stabilisation process is to prop the building to protect it from any further collapses. Once that's done, steps will be taken to remove any remaining collapse material safely. An investigation team will then be able to access the site to ascertain the likely cause of the land slip.

The Council is working with contractors to stabilise the site and then move on to repair the collapsed retaining wall and adjacent carriageway. Major works will be necessary to repair the wall and carriageway, including the diversion of essential services. The full scope of these works isn't known at present, but it's likely that the road will remain closed for at least 12 months. The extent and duration of the work will depend on the findings of the investigation. The response to the land slip is being progressed as promptly as possible.
