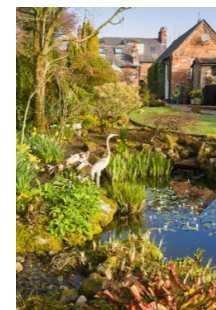


GARDENS OPEN UNDER THE NATIONAL GARDENS SCHEME

HIELD CLOSE CHILDREN'S PLAY AREA

A tale of dedication and persistence

Anyone taking a walk through Hield Grove in our adjacent parish of Aston-by-Budworth can hardly have failed to note that the sadly neglected children's play area has undergone a major programme of refurbishment, including the replacement of the dilapidated children's play equipment. This transformation is largely down to the determined efforts of Hield Grove resident and devoted grandfather, Ben Benson (pictured next to the play area, right).



We are happy to report on the progress that Ben has been making in recent years in upgrading the play area and surrounding land. Ben began by applying for a local authority grant (ultimately received) and then added to it, not only £1800 of his own money, but also donations from very generous local residents, to whom he expresses his grateful thanks.



There have been setbacks along the way: the green was damaged when the play apparatus was being installed, but when ground conditions are suitable Cheshire East Council will return to landscape the grassed area. When that has been done a second bench will be added to the one that already exists and a heavy duty set of goal posts with nets (already acquired) will be installed to go along with the slide, swings and other children's play apparatus.

Cheshire East also plan to cut back tree branches that look dangerous and the area will be further improved by the planting of various bulbs that Ben plans to buy.

The play area apparatus is currently closed to allow the ground to recover: Ben hopes that it will be opened for use very soon.

Whilst keeping the play area scheme going ahead at full speed, Ben has taken on another project as well: retaining the notice board that he contends is very useful for both visitors and residents. A meeting of Great Budworth Parish Council was held on Monday 7th March in the Parish Hall. The meeting was attended by six Parish Councillors and the Parish Clerk. No members of the public attended.

The following is a summary of the proceedings. Full minutes of the meeting are available on the Great Budworth website.



Budworth Lane

Councillors were not aware of anything that can currently be done about the situation, given national guidance on speed limits and safety improvements, coupled with CW&C's unwillingness to acknowledge and address the problem.

Top Pumphouse Trees

Contractors had been asked to provide quotations before 18th March for the work specified in the approval notice from CW&C.

Treework to The Avenue

The chosen contractor, Treefellers, had advised that there was no availability to carry out the work before the bird-nesting season. It was agreed that the work should be done in September/October.

Bowling Green and Tennis Club Agreement

Cllr. Wilkinson had prepared a plan of the extent of the land covered by the lease (as required by the Land Registry) and would provide this to Steven Jennings, who had drafted the lease.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee

It was agreed that Maggie Blower (on behalf of Jubilee event organisers) should submit a Small Grant Application to enable the transfer of funds (£1,500) from the Parish Council, as agreed at the last Parish Council meeting. This would be paid into a bank account she had set up for the specific purpose. After the event, a breakdown of how the money was spent was to be submitted to the Council.

Assets

An Asset Register is available for the purpose of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return. This lists values for all assets owned by the Parish Council and does not change year on year unless new assets are acquired. However, an up-to-date assessment of reinstatement values was needed for insurance purposes.

Next Meeting

The next meeting will be the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council and will take place on Monday 9th May at 7pm in the Parish Hall. All are welcome.

SCHOOL NEWS

School has been a hive of activity this past month. Our younger children have been looking around for signs of spring and all that comes with the season.

Towards the end of the half term, we will be holding our Easter Service in Church. Each class will retell an aspect of the Easter story through drama, readings, and poetry. The children are busy learning some new Easter songs, to retell the Easter story.

Our wonderful Friends of the School (FotS) have been busy collecting Easter Eggs in time for our Easter bingo. The children will be decorating Easter bonnets and creating 'egg' pun boxes/models – eggstraordinary!

The school federation has been struck by the conflict in Ukraine and the plight of the refugee families. We have collected essential items generously donated by our school families. Class 4 have studied poetry about diversity and the needs of refugees, writing their own poems in the form of a recipe called New Beginnings.

We celebrated World Book Day and our children and staff dressed up as a range of book characters. The portrayal, by our head teacher, Mrs Wainwright, of Miss Trunchbull from Matilda by Roald Dahl was very life-like (thank goodness her real persona resembles more that of Miss Honey!). Other book characters were Goldilocks, Where's Wally, The Bad-tempered Ladybird, The Hungry Caterpillar, Mr Perfect (from the Mr Men series) and Gangsta Granny and characters from the World of Harry Potter, the Cat in the Hat, Alice in Wonderland, various Disney princesses, Robin Hood and Stick Man. Classes one and two were visited by a mystery reader, who not only was Red Riding Hood, but appeared as the Wolf dressed as Granny, too. Her visit was much appreciated. Please do come back again.

Comic relief was on 18th March and to mark the occasion we sold red noses and had an own clothes day, wearing a 'hint of red' in support of this charity.

Our older children competed in the small schools' sports hall athletics competition, which was a wonderful opportunity for competitive sports with children of a similar age. We are looking forward to competing in many other events later in the year.

MORE TALES FROM PORTMEIRION

I remember one couple who, with their daughter, went to Portmeirion every Friday, returning Sunday. He was an estate agent from Preston and his wife bought antiques from the shop in the village run by Sylvia Jones. Their daughter fell madly in love with the Italian head waiter of the bohemian restaurant there called 'The Salutation'.

At my Antiques shop, 'Cestrian Antiques', in Altrincham, I would often have someone drive up with items for sale in their car or van. This was how I met a man (I will call him 'David') who at that time was a commercial estate agent. He would sometimes have a desk left in a property by an outgoing tenant. Partner desks were immensely popular and they were also nice for me to deal with as they separated into three easily moveable sections.



David asked if I would like to go to his house where, in his garage, were three desks, one by the well-known furniture maker Gillow of Lancaster. He lived with his wife and children in West Didsbury in a house they were updating. I visited a few times, having to be there at 8am before he went to work. Georgina - or 'Georgie' - his incredibly attractive wife, would be in full makeup and the children aged four, five and six years old would be in very pretty dresses or suits even at that time in the morning! Georgina had been married before and had a son, aged 11, who lived with them, a pupil at Manchester Grammar School.

David had found a source of kitchen equipment at cost price and he opened a business on Kingsway, Manchester, which became highly successful. By this time I had become good friends with the family and, having recently moved to Great Budworth, I needed an electric hob, so I went to his shop. He was not in, so I was served by a woman I did not know. I asked about David and she told me his wife had left him. I really couldn't believe this or take it in, but the assistant said, "Well you know who she is, don't you? She is Ruth Ellis's daughter." I replied that I hadn't known. Ruth Ellis was, of course, famous as the last woman to be hanged in the UK, following the fatal shooting of her lover.

David moved to an apartment in Hale and he experienced tough times. Sadly, he was struggling, despite still managing to keep the children happy and healthy and going to school, plus buying for the shop. Unfortunately, it turned out that his wife had many affairs during their marriage. Her life, though, ended in a sad downfall. She married

Please make clear at the time of delivering your cake which of these you choose.
