Vicola Ashbrook, an author based in the village, has recently had her second book published. The Anatomical History of Violet Vee is a novella-in-flash telling the life story of Violet - a daring, flamboyant, glamorous and mischievous heroine - through all of the ailments she suffers.

A novella-in-flash is a relatively modern genre, in which each story, or 'flash', stands alone but when read together, there is an overarching story too. In this case, an uplifting, at times risqué, tale of a life well-lived. As the blurb says,

"Violet Vee is a firework of positivity; a mascot for our troubled times."

Violet Vee is published through a small independent publisher, The Alien Buddha, but is available on Amazon.

Nicola's previous novella-in-flash, 'Mae in Quinquennia' is available through Selcouth Station. She also has a flash fiction collection, The Art of Escapology, available to pre-order with Bearded Badger Press.

Publishing, like many sectors, has been hit by the rise in costs and small independent presses are particularly impacted. Selcouth Station, like many smaller presses, will sadly be folding at the end of the year.

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A meeting of Great Budworth Parish Council was held on Monday 5th September in the Parish Hall. The following is a summary of the proceedings. The minutes will be published on the village website in due course.

In addition to Parish and CW&C councillors, the meeting was attended by 18 members of the public, who were concerned about the school's planning application to erect a 2.4 metre (almost 8'0") metal fence around the perimeter of the school

field. Representatives from the school were invited, but none attended.

A discussion concerning this application dominated the meeting and so this report will consist largely of a summary of that. The main points made were as follows:

- Some inaccuracies in the planning application were noted.
- It was noted that the school playing field does not belong to the school, but instead to CW&C. Cllr Wright (CW&C councillor) was asked to determine the exact nature of the relationship between CW&C and the school in respect of the field.
- A resident quoted from the Government's DFE guidance regarding safeguarding, noting that it advises that safeguarding plans should 'be based on a realistic assessment of the threats' and should 'reflect the balance between maintaining an open and welcoming environment for learners, parents and the wider community ...'.
- Concerns were expressed about the impact of a fence on the natural environment; in particular, on the adjacent Avenue, with its mature lime trees, but also on the many species of shrub on the boundary, hawthorn, holly, whitethorn, lime, mulberry and laurel.
- Several people pointed out that that since time immemorial the field has been regarded as a communal facility, used out of school hours for informal games.
- It was noted that Sport England is a statutory consultee in respect of planning applications in which it is proposed to remove a publicly available sports facility. They should therefore be consulted.
- Asked how they could register their objections, members of the public were advised to contact CW&C Planning, either by email
 (planning@cheshirewestandchester.gov.uk) or by post (Cheshire West and Chester Council, The Portal, Wellington Road, Ellesmere Port, CH65 0BA). It was agreed that the Parish Council would write to the Planning Dept. to object to the application on the grounds outlined above.

Other items:

It was noted that the two days of filming (for quite separate projects) resulted in donations to the Parish Council of £3,300, which would go towards village projects.

CW&C Highways have confirmed that they will clean road signage and cut back branches, where necessary, though they have not yet given a date.

Some farm equipment will also be stored in the building, which will include toilet and rest facilities for the staff who pick the vegetables in all weathers. As David says, he has to look after the team!

David and Rebecca plan to plant trees, shrubs and wildflowers around the building to soften its visual impact and, once the scaffolding has been removed and the green roof sheeting and side sheets are in place, the building will blend in with its surroundings quite nicely. In the meantime, he advises us that a lo-




cal ornithologist, who lives in Great Budworth and collects wildflower seeds from David's fields. has observed that the local bird population of rare breeds has shot up since they started growing vegetables on the land. GROOBOX GROWS A SHED

bservant readers may have noticed a structure being built on the hillside of the farm on the south-west side of the A559. The farm is owned by David Fryer, whose company, Groobox, grows seasonal vegetables which are sold direct to the public. Following comments made by locals to one or two of

his team, David tells us that the building is not an early sign of a scheme to avoid planning restrictions (David recalls being approached by two developers who each wanted to buy different lots of the land in order to erect a 'farm building', only to then rent them out as units to construction firms, thus evading planning regulations).

David and his wife, Rebecca, are both keen to assure locals that the building being constructed is for the purpose of storing the produce grown – potatoes, squash, beetroot, cauliflowers, cabbages and broccoli – in refrigerated conditions, along with seeds, plants and nutrients.


