The Parish Council Annual Meeting took place in Great Budworth Parish Hall on Monday 15th May. The following is a summary of the proceedings. The full minutes will be put on the Great Budworth website following their approval at the next meeting in July.

Karen Hammond was elected Chairman and David Wilkinson was elected Vice Chairman. Janet Bennett, the new Parish Clerk, invited the retiring Chairman, Don Hammond, to deliver his annual report (see page 8).



Councillors agreed that Justin Culver would lead on specific matters of business in relation to Manchester Airport and HS2.

The Clerk and Cllr. Wise would lead on matters of business regarding the Great Budworth Parish Council website.

The Chairman requested that all attendees provide feedback on the PC website.

Cllr. Culver agreed to add a post on the village WhatsApp group encouraging people to provide feedback on the village website.

<u>Budget</u>: the Clerk gave a full account of the accounts for 2022 – 2023 and advised that the figures quoted were only provisional and subject to audit.

The Clerk and past Chairman Don Hammond had calculated and agreed the 2023 – 2024 budget. End of year accounts would be submitted during the first week of June 2023.

Planning Applications:

Ref:22/02029/FUL Great Budworth Primary School: It was brought to the council's attention by a member of the public that the school had ordered a biodiversity report at the request of the Conservation Officer.

Ref:23/01119/FUL Westage Farm: an application to build a stable block. There were no objections

Ref: 23/01360/CAT The Coach House: tree pruning/felling. There were no objections.

<u>Highways:</u> Potholes – Some potholes had been repaired on High Street and Church Street. It was suggested that Westage Lane will soon become impassable owing to the number of potholes. Cllr. Wise asked if CWAC could inform the village residents when work was to commence as this would allow parked cars to be moved from the road, making more potholes accessible. The Clerk agreed to contact CWAC to establish if this was possible. She also agreed to add a link to the Village WhatsApp to enable members of the public direct access to the CW&C webpage for reporting potholes.

Cllr. Wilkinson had reported a blocked drain by his land to CWAC but no action had yet been taken by CW&C.

BUDWORTH SAILING CLUB EARNS ROYAL SEAL OF APPROVAL

The Commodore explained that the club's focus on training and development of newcomers to the sport is vital to its continued growth and future success.

Maintenance:

Annual undergrowth clearance of the Avenue: the Clerk would contact John Eaton to establish when this is likely to take place. [Update: Don Hammond has since strimmed part of the eastern end of The Avenue.]

Repair to roof of the bottom Pump House: Members of the public raised concerns about the damage to the roof and asked councillors if the roof should be repaired or fully replaced. This had been discussed several times in recent years, with a number of quotations received for different repairs. However, nothing had been progressed. It was agreed that three new quotations would be sought, with the results to be discussed at the July Council meeting. The Clerk agreed to locate the file for the Bottom Pump House to see if previous quotations had been saved.

Members of the public reported damage to the trunk of a tree on the Avenue. It had not been confirmed how the damage occurred. It was speculated that the damage may have been caused by badgers (there being a new badger set on The Avenue); a further suggestion was that the damage may have been caused by a muntjac deer.

Other matters arising: Comberbach Parish Council had approached Great Budworth Parish Council requesting a financial contribution to the cost of reducing the speed limit on Budworth Lane and Cock Lane from 50mph to 40mph. The total cost was estimated at £7,300, of which CW&C would contribute £3,650. CW&C had conducted a speed survey which found that the median speed of traffic travelling along the Lane from Comberbach to Great Budworth was 41 mph. After consideration of the report Councillors voted unanimously against making any financial contribution.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 10th July 2023.

LLOYDS PHARMACY PULLING OUT OF SAINSBURY'S NORTHWICH

any of us will be sad to lose the Lloyds pharmacy branch located in Sainsbury's, Northwich. A staff member has said they will be closing on 7th June. When asked what was behind the closures (there are many more such closures), she said that in part it was owing to chemists being increasingly required to undertake additional responsibilities by the government and NHS, which eats away at the company's profitability. There's bound to be more to it than that, but it will be a great loss for those of us who find it convenient to collect prescriptions whilst doing our grocery shopping.



GREAT BUDWORTH PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT 2022-23

The following is an abridged version of the report given by Cllr. Don Hammond (pictured), outgoing Chairman of Great Budworth Parish Council, at the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council on Monday 15th May (for draft minutes, see page 6).

Parish Clerk - towards the end of March 2022, Gill Ayres resigned as Parish Clerk. This caused some difficulties over the year. These included problems concerning the transfer of passwords, computer systems, files, IT equipment, VAT returns, access to the Parish Clerk Google mail account and so on. This increased the workload of various Parish Councillors, in particular Anna Lee and Bill Anderson, whom I



thank you for their efforts. Following a recruitment campaign Janet Bennett was appointed Parish Clerk with effect from February 2023. Thank you, Janet.

Aircraft Noise Consultation - it is expected that new air traffic routes will be agreed and implemented in 2025/26. This follows an ongoing airspace modernisation strategy in an effort to reduce noise and CO2 emissions. Aircraft navigation systems will be based on satellites, rather than fixed ground-level transmitters. Great Budworth has been an active participant in the discussions, albeit with virtually no influence, but the issue is complicated as the Manchester Airport airspace is impacted by the Liverpool Airport Airspace.

IT systems - the change in the Parish Clerk has provided an opportunity for an overdue review of some of the IT systems. We have bought a new laptop and are in the process of implementing the web-based SCRIBE accounting system, and we have cancelled subscriptions to some unnecessary outdated services, all of which should make life easier for the Clerk and cheaper for the Council.

Speeding in the village - the Parish Council encouraged a speed monitoring exercise which indicated that, despite some residents considering vehicle speed in the village to be excessive, there is little evidence that there is a serious speeding problem. It would be possible to have a community Speed Watch exercise using equipment from Cheshire West.

Bowling Green and Tennis Club Agreement - after discussions over many months, the wording was agreed and a lease was eventually signed on 30 November 2022. I would like to thank Steven Jennings for his help in the matter.

The Avenue Trees. In early 2022, members of the Parish Council undertook some clearance of undergrowth. Thank you. In the autumn further work was undertaken by John Eaton and in September 2022 major tree surgery was undertaken in accordance

with the recommendations of our Tree Survey of 2021. One lime tree was taken down and a further eight lime trees had significant growth removed. Clearing the undergrowth is an ongoing problem for the Parish Council.

The Top Pumphouse Holm Oaks were pruned in October and should need no further work during the next four or five years.

Lower Pumphouse issues:

- 1. Water Testing following a comprehensive water test on 28 September 2022, the water was found to be hard, with minimal quantities of lead, copper, zinc, iron, manganese, aluminium and arsenic. However, a few coliform bacteria were found which is undesirable but not necessarily harmful. Precautionary notices were installed in the pumphouse but were immediately vandalised. More recently, as Chairman, I have undertaken two further water tests which indicated that there were no coliform bacteria present in the samples that I took. Cheshire West and Chester have indicated that they will be undertaking a further test, but the matter is in their hands and out of our control as the Parish Council.
- 2. **Repairs and the waterspout** during the year there was additional leakage from the waterspout and a temporary replacement was installed by an enthusiastic water drinker. I'm pleased to say that a more permanent fixture has been fitted.

Filming in the Village - filming took place in the village on two occasions, both of which generated income for the Parish and neither of which was unduly intrusive.

Planning and the School Fence - around August the village and the Parish Council discovered that the village School was proposing to erect a fence around the village field to a height of 2.4m for "safeguarding". It was unfortunate that there was no discussion or consultation with the community in advance of the planning application. As has been extensively reported in the Budworth Bulletin, there were a number of failures and errors in the original Planning Application and a revised application will be required.

Parish precept. I am delighted that we did not need to increase the Precept. Expenditure during the year was contained and we had some reduction in expenditure owing to not having a Parish Clerk. With the additional revenue from filming, the finances should be in a reasonable state. However, fixed overheads consume a disproportionate amount of the revenue, leaving little for Council initiatives.

Potholes. The Parish Council puts significant pressure on Cheshire West and Chester to repair our potholed roads, but in many ways representations from individual cyclists and members of the public have a greater impact. Great Budworth is on the Cheshire cycle route (which may or may not be desirable) but the presence of significant potholes is a material safety issue. We are assured that we are 'priority', but it would be good to see appropriate long lasting repairs.
